Saskatchewan Trophy Whitetail Deer Hunts at Discounted Prices!

Ah huge heavy whitetail buck with massive antlers to match.

Nature has a rule the farther you travel north the more mass a animal must obtain to make it through the long cold winter. The farther you go south the less mass the animal must obtain to be able to self-ventilate or cool. Taking the south eastern states vs Canada you can see how the rule works. In addition nature makes the antler size in proportion to the animal's size because they must withstand the grueling fighting during the rut with the massive strength the two rutting bucks have.

The outcome is the quick growth of massive antlers in the northland and they quickly grow larger every year. More record book whitetail bucks are shot in the Chadian provinces then then anyone that hunts the lower 48 states could imagine. You will note the chiastic of heavy antlers with tines that almost look short in comparison to the mass measurement of the antlers.

When you are ready for a wall mount you are ready for Canada. Other things work in to the equation also being genes of course which develop over years of high protein and minerals coming in to the

through food plot agricultural feed and natural food sources. Places with the vitamins and minerals traditionally have developed the genes and are none for big bucks year after year.

Working your way across Canada through the provinces you will find that BC is the highest prices hunts, with Alberta not far behind. Saskatchewan is the bread basket of reasonably priced deer hunts. For the most part it is all white tail and the deer regulations change by province but the Saskatchewan regulations favor the hunter more than the previous two.

This outfitter runs a trophy whitetail hunt destination with the minimum whitetail taken being a 140 that's only 20 points short of the Boone and Crockett minimum score. You will seldom find this level of quality anywhere else in the US or Canada.

We are located a mere hour's drive from where the World Record Hanson Buck was killed. We historically take massive bucks every year which say good genes and we have what it took to get the genes up to that quality repeatedly.

Our Camp

Our Whitetail camp is situated in the world famous southern Saskatchewan farm land, renowned for producing large whitetail deer antler growth. This allows us the opportunity to offer a limited number of high end hunts to our non-resident clients coming to Canada who want a fair chance to harvest a trophy whitetail buck. Limited numbers of Elk, Moose and Wolf hunts are also available. This private hunting area is in excess of 7,500 acres and has had an ongoing year round management plan for the last eight years. Over 450 acres of food plots for moose, deer and elk have been planted. 30+ supplemental mineral lick stations have been established. An intense feeding program of grain and alfalfa hay starts late summer and runs through mid-winter, this assures that the animals are in good condition in the spring and don't require months of feeding to make up for a weight deficit that most deer go through. In this was the calcium and phosphorus and calcium coming into the body keeps the body mineral needs satisfied so that when the antlers begin growing the minerals can go directly into horn growth and not the body first as in most situations.

These types of wildlife management programs help to keep deer numbers high. We manage this property for Trophy Bucks! Only mature, adult bucks are harvested with a minimum score of 140 Boone and Crockett points.

For one week Rut hunts are offered in the month of November, as well as early archery hunts in the Pre Rut of late October. Hunters have the luxury of completely enclosed and **heated blind**. These hunts can be custom tailored to the individual hunter's needs and group size. If you have ever hunted November in Canada with daily high temperatures hovering around 0 fahrenheit you will appreciate the heated blinds and never hunt again without them.

Last year's report was...

The Deer Season saw many happy hunters return home with the high quality Whitetail Buck of their dreams, and lots of hunting stories to go with them. Our largest was taken by Scott who harvested a heavy 190 inch 10 point. We had great weather with a bit of early snow which made for good deer movement and lots of activity at the food plots and bait stations. At the time of this writing: mid-February, we have found a good number of very respectable shed antlers. One antler alone measured 89 B and C points! A world class buck for sure! The winter has seen below average snow levels making it easier on the deer. All of this points towards healthy deer numbers again this Fall.

THE HUNT

The hunting method of choice in the aspen parkland regions of the province is stand-hunting. Saskatchewan regulations permit baiting, and this has proven to be a very effective way to concentrate the deer. The hunter should expect to sit on stand for hours at a time, all day preferably. Properly equipped, any hunter can do this. We have a few tree stands, but mostly our clients hunt from insulated tower blinds or, most likely, from one of our comfortable tent blinds that can be heated if need be.

Mostly we use comfortable, insulated, portable, heated blinds which will keep you well concealed and out of the wind.. Some stands are set up farther from the baits, and shots can be long, but for the most part are set for shots of 50-200 yards. Although recent fall seasons have been "cooking hot," in Saskatchewan, the weather can get extremely cold and history has shown that the colder it is, the better your chances are for taking a huge buck. Once you send us your deposit, a complete list of extreme cold weather gear will be sent to you and we highly recommend you take our advice for gear. The longer you can sit in your blind, the better your odds for taking a buck of a lifetime.

TRAVEL TIPS

Getting Here

Passport

Everyone entering Canada by sea or air, beginning, including US Citizens, will need a passport. All American hunters, planning to hunt in Canada or elsewhere in the future, should apply for a passport right away if you don't already possess one.

Canadian Firearm Restrictions

The Canada Border Services Agency is responsible for deciding whether to let a non-resident bring a firearm into Canada. As a general rule, non-residents may bring a non-restricted rifle or shotgun into Canada for approved purposes such as hunting, target shooting, wilderness protection or in-transit movement by a reasonably direct route to another point outside Canada.

Restricted firearms (mainly handguns and some semi-automatic long guns) can generally only be imported if the person can demonstrate a need for having the firearms in Canada - for example to take part in an organized target-shooting event.

For more information on the documents you will need to import a firearm, please refer to the fact sheet for firearm owners visiting Canada.

You can meet Canada's license and registration requirements by presenting a Non-resident Firearm Declaration (form 909), to a customs officer at your point of entry. If you have more than three firearms, attach the Non-Resident Firearm Declaration - Continuation Sheet (form 910). Once the customs officer has confirmed your declaration, it will serve as a temporary license for you and a registration certificate for each firearm listed on the declaration for up to 60 days. A confirmed declaration costs a flat fee of \$25 Canadian.

If you frequently go to Canada to hunt (must be 18 years of age or older), you may want to obtain a Possession and Acquisition License (PAL). To apply for a PAL, fill out form CAFC 921. With your application, please provide proof that you have passed the Canadian Firearms Safety Course. If you wish to be licensed to possess restricted firearms for an approved purpose such as target shooting, you must also include proof that you have passed the Canadian Restricted Firearms Safety Course. If you have not yet passed the tests, you will need to do so before you apply for a PAL. A course from another country will not meet the requirements of the law. You can take the tests without taking the courses.

Before submitting the application, contact the Chief Firearms Officer of the province or territory where you will most likely be using the firearm to find out what documentation you need to provide from authorities in your country to confirm that you are not known to be a threat to public safety. The two

references required to sign your application do not have to be Canadian citizens or persons in authority. An initial PAL costs \$60 for non-restricted firearms only, or \$80 for any combination of non-restricted and restricted firearms.

Once you have obtained a license, you can apply online to register your firearms. Alternatively, you may submit a paper application (form 998) to Central Processing Site, Box 1200, Miramichi, NB E1N 5Z3. Your firearms need to be verified by an approved verifier before they can be registered. For help to verify your firearms, call (800) 731-4000 (Canada and the U.S.) or (506) 624-5380 (outside Canada and the U.S.).

Information on how to obtain the Possession and Acquisition License and forms can be obtained on the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Web site, or by calling call (800) 731-4000. Prior to leaving the U.S., you should register your firearm at a Customs and Border Protection (CBP) office on the CBP Form 4457 Certificate of Registration for Personal Effects Taken Abroad. You will need this form to present to CBP upon your return to the U.S.

For more information about Canada's regulations for temporarily importing a firearm, please contact the Canadian Border Services Agency at (800) 461-9999.

If you have a Felony of any class on your record Canadian Customs will not allow you into Canada.

Once you have traveled to Canada once you will find it extremely to get through customs. In fact most Americans say it is more difficult going back through the American customs and they live in the US. I will be happy to assist anyone that has any questions.
