









Hunt ID: CO-Elk-All-CD-CERD-IMJ

Are you tired of expensive elk hunting trips that cost thousands, while you walk in the woods you're your rifle over your shoulder and have nothing to show for the week except sore feet, tired shoulders and a cold? How about an archery, muzzleloader or first elk hunt with a guarantee. The guarantee is that if you don't get an elk, you don't pay!

We are here to fix that problem. If you are hunting for a meat cow we have mature cow elk for only \$1295. Not only for the guided hunt but it also covers the elk cleaning, skinning and hauling and loading into your vehicle. Somewhat a turnkey solution to a hunt that didn't turn out the way you had hoped it would for the thousands you had put into it. If you want to cut it up yourself you may or if you take it to a butcher it usually runs about \$275 depending on the size of the elk you shoot, they are \$.75-.99 per pound hanging weight. I can give you some phone numbers and addresses to contact for this service.

Remember in this kind of hunt you will not have to purchase a state of Colorado elk license which can save \$660 over a free ranging elk. I will provide you with all of the required documentation so that you don't need a \$660 license and I will give that for free just coming to hunt with us. Also different from other licenses you will not have to put in an application and your \$660 in April to possibly draw a license, we save you that wait and that money. You also are not restricted to any specific weapons during any type of date range. Rifle, Pistol, Bow or Muzzleloader are all possible weapons but you must be accurate and the weapon large enough to stop an elk. A wounded animal you will pay for and may not be able to take it home with you. I feel every animal deserved a quick painless death and we will also do everything possible to track and locate any wounded elk. You will be hunting in ponderosa pines and junipers which is thick enough for elk to disappear right in front of your eyes.

This hunt can be in September through February. Conditions of habitat and elk change during this time which can make your hunt easier or more difficult please get with me so I can advise of the best time for the hunt that you wish to have. The ranch encompasses 330 acres of prime Colorado elk country. You will be hunting thick cedar and juniper trees and bushes in deep draws where the elk go for protection. Hunts in September usually allow bugling and cow calls to call the bulls into you and watching them tear up the landscape coming to you for battle. As you sit in a downwind location from your oncoming bull your caller drives to irritate the bull since he is 20 yards back from you in pure safety. You on the other hand are looking for the thickest juniper tree that you can put the body that you have lived with all of your life and a 1000 pound bull elk hormone enraged with the calling imitating a rival bull lighting his fuse. With his big rack he is taking on trees and bushes swathing out a trail in the dark soil. He raked the brush and ground, leans back and lets out an ear piercing bugle that at 10 feet just plain hurts your ears. Then he urinates on the freshly tilled black soil. Your location downwind of him is so he won't smell you but the pungent urine spray reminds you how close you are to this highly agitated testosterone charged big bull elk.

This to a non-elk hunter is "gross" and you would never get me to do that. To an elk hunter this is the highest high in elk hunting. To fool the monarch of the mountains so completely that he has lost all sense of danger, and wants "you!" You know that you have completely fooled him and now you are in his

world, face to face, and your adrenaline is bubbling out like never before. You feel the fear, the sheer joy, and the knowledge with skill to get in that location and position in his world is only lived by few, and you are now one of those few.

The shot, rifle, pistol, muzzleloader or bow is a secondary climax providing a trophy that you will certainly remember for the rest of your life as you see the monster on your game room wall. You have met him on the mountain in his world, under his terms, and won. He must win every battle to survive and has to live to this ripe old age. You must only win once, but it may take many years to get that win.

When it is over you are drenched with sweat, you are weak from the stress, and your arms feel like wet wash rags. You have the energy to smile, but not to get up without help. You have met the challenge and you will live to fight another day!

If you are looking for a wall hanger we have various sized Bulls ranging from 5X5 and up -- even a 9X7 Trophy Bull. All elk are hung after the hunt, entrails removed, bled, and skinned. Then the elk are loaded into your truck for transport to meat processing. Depending on the time of the year and associated temperatures procedures may change slightly. No licenses or tags are required on our private ranch to draw or pay for. This can provide a savings of \$650 right off the top of a free range bull elk hunt.

About Colorado Elk

The elk are also called "Wapiti", which is the Cree Indian word for "white" referring to the color of the animal's rump. In the wild, elk live chiefly in high, open mountain pastures in the summer and in lower wooded slopes or dense woods during the winter.

They are named just like cattle: cow, bull, calf. We handle and manage them like cattle. In the summer, the cows and calves live together while the bulls form "bachelor" herds. In the fall, breeding season the bulls fight, sometimes to the death, for a harem. The bull elk will stand on its rear legs and strike out with his sharp, cloven hooves. Not only are the bulls strong, they are very fast, running up to 35 mph,

and, unlike deer, they can move through the forest almost silently. The calves are born with white spots for camouflage just like a deer fawn.

Elk range in forest and forest-edge habitat, feeding on grasses, plants, leaves and bark. Although native to North America and eastern Asia, they have adapted well to countries where they have been introduced, including New Zealand and Argentina. Their high level of adaptability poses a threat to endemic species and ecosystems where they have been introduced.

Male elk have large antlers which are shed each year. Males engage in ritualized mating behaviors during the rut, including posturing, antler wrestling and bugling, a loud series of screams which establishes dominance over other males and attracts females. The bugle call is one of the most distinctive calls in nature.

Each March the bulls shed their rack of antlers. The rack will drop off completely and the next one is already starting to grow. The new antlers, which grow almost an inch a day, are filled with blood vessels and can weigh up to 35 pounds. The antlers have a velvet-like covering, which is why we call this process "in the velvet." They will reach their full length in mid-summer when the blood vessels inside dry up and the much-lighter antler become calcified like a bone. Preparing himself for breeding season, the bull runs the velvet off on tree limbs and sharpens the tines.

The Elk Lifestyle

Habits: Most active in the mornings and evenings, are usually seen in groups of 25 or more.

Diet: Feeds on grasses, twigs, bark, and herbs.

Lifespan: Lives 14 years in wild and as many as 25 years in captivity.

In the summer we even have a few prairie dogs that you can sharpen up your eye on after using our range to be certain that your rifle is on target.
